





In Prayer, 'Don't Do All The Talking'

How do you approach God? We have so many choices: the repetitive rhythm of the rosary and litanies, the penetrating words and melody of a hymn, prayers we read and those we have committed to memory. We can open ourselves to God through centering prayer. Some of us pray in tongues. All of us can pray in our own words. We can pray alone, in small groups and in large groups. We can be piously reverent or shake the walls with amplified music and joyous singing. Regardless of the way we choose to pray, the foundation of our prayer remains the same.

That foundation is faith and trust in God. Whether we use the straightforward approach of Jairus or the timid approach of the hemorrhaging woman, God welcomes us with open arms. God is always ready to engage us in conversation and will accommodate whatever method of communication we choose. Take time today to consider the different ways you pray. Assess how well each method works for you. Try something new or dust off a method you found fruitful in the past. But follow one rule. Don't do all the talking. Take time to listen for God's voice.
